Neel tried the meal, which she says is a food specialty in France, and admitted the taste wasn't "that bad."

"It was just the idea of eating something raw," she said.

Neel also saw first-hand how serious Europeans take their soccer.

Because her exchange coincided with the 2002 World Cup, she saw the city come to a virtual standstill during the month of June.

"The country came to a stop, even businesses closed.

"There were a lot of celebrations every time France

won, but when the team lost, almost no one came out of their homes."

The soccer experience was much the same for 18-year-old Ashley Young, who spent the past year in San Carlos, Brazil.

The one major difference was that Brazil won the World Cup.

"June was one big party," said Young, a Blind River resident.

"School was canceled every time Brazil played because the games would take place early in the morning and school also starts early in San Carlos.

"For other games, there was a television at the school and students would watch the games during breaks. Some also brought small radios to class and even the teachers would ask them for
